The Problem of Evil

Honors 3390H (Index #172603) Professor Hutcheson.

Is it reasonable to believe in an all-knowing, all-powerful, and all-good God, despite the appearance of gratuitous evil? This course will consist in an examination of major attempts to answer this question. (Substitutes for International Studies and advanced philosophy. Open to majors and minors. Contact the philosophy department for more information, 245-2285.)

History of Philosophy Before 1600

Phil 2311 (Index #167332) Professor Geuras. Early Greek, Roman, and medieval systems of thought.

Metaphysics

Phil 4370 (Index #167338)

Professor Kalsi.

Systematic study of metaphysical problems by examination of classical and modern texts. Topics considered will involve being and unity, mind and matter, God, causation and necessity, free will and determinism.

Philosophy of Education

Phil 4388.1 (Index #167339)

Professor Carson.

This course, which might be subtitled "Education from the Cradle to the Grave," will be an investigation into the major ideas on educational theory and practice put forth by both classical and contemporary philosophers. Some of the topics to be explored are: the nature of education, meaning and the learning process, moral education, ideology and educational institutions, and the philosophy of teaching.

Social and Political Philosophy

Phil 3332 (Index #172433)

Professor Luizzi.

Critical exazmination of major theories concerning the organization of societies and governments. The focus this semester is is on social relationships like citizen-state, marriage relationship, student-teacher, professional-client/patient.
