


In Memoriam Gina Weatherhead November 24, 1979-January 21, 2006

Ethics Bowl


Two teams of Texas State Univers. philosophy students brought home 3rd and 4 place trophies from the 8th Annual Centra Texas Regional Ethics Bowl held at St. Mary's University, Saturday, November 12th. Texas State will also send a team to the National Ethics Bowl competition on March 2 in Jacksonville, Florida.

The ethics competition, patterned after the 1960's television series College Bowl, requires students to answer questions and attempt to resolve ethical dilemmas in such areas as medicine, privacy, government policy, education, business, and technology. Criteria for judging include the clarity, intelligibility, deliberative thoughtfulness and ethical relevance of the team's presentation and responses to judges' questions.

Faculty coaches are professors C. Lynne Fulmer and Jo Ann Carson, with students Sonia Arredondo, Jennifer Grace, and Deacon Newhouse serving as assistant coaches. The Ethics Bowl teams are sponsored by the philosophy department and *Phi Sigma Tau*, the philosophy honor society.
