LETTER FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT



Texas State University students, faculty and staff have done amazing things over the past year while weathering one of the most impactful pandemics in history. This has been a trying year, to say the least, with a global health crisis, a national social justice crisis, and a once-in-a-century winter storm in Texas. We have also experienced a financial crisis as many families were significantly impacted by the pandemic. One of the primary ways that we can honor and recognize the great work all of you have done over the past year is getting our students back to Texas State, and returning the university to the growth that has been such an important part of our history. In order to get our students back, we must reduce the financial hurdles they face as the world comes back to normal. The federal government provided a variety of stimulus dollars to help college students and higher education institutions as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act or, CARES Act. The UPD Dispatch Team improvised and didn't miss a beat in responding to emergency calls resulting from the weather emergency. The team shared personal cell phone numbers to keep the lines of communication open with resident assistants, students, police officers, and even parents when power and phone service was down. Because of their commitment and persistence, UPD delivered quick and reliable emergency services during the weather event. Several team members stayed overnight on campus to ensure they would be available for their next shift.

The Utilities Team stood up backup generators to supply electricity to key buildings and the Jackson water well which provides water to most of campus. The team maintained system water pressure levels above minimum limits by manually operating the transfer pumps at the well house and refueled the generators around the clock by making trips to the Transdev Shuttle Maintenance facility. The multiple blackouts prevented the boilers at Central Plant from refiring until power was fully restored. However, the boilers at West Plant were operational when intermittent power was restored and the team focused its attention these units. Once the main boilers came back on, the team had to switch the load to feed steam to Texas State buildings, including residence halls. Members of this team worked long hours, stayed overnight on campus, and continuously turned the university power back on manually.



tool in helping students. This bill allotted \$14 billion to the Office of Postsecondary Education as the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund, or HEERF.

HEERF has since received two more rounds of additional funding, the latest of which is known as the American Rescue Plan (ARP) which was signed into law on March 11, 2021, providing \$39.6 billion in support to institutions of higher education to serve students and ensure learning continues during the COVID-19 pandemic. The total emergency funds available to institutions and their students is \$76.2 billion.

Texas State's share of these funds stands at just over \$180 million. These funds are making a huge difference for our students. As a university, we took several different approaches to provide as much financial relief as possible in response to our students' financial difficulties. We streamlined funding disbursement, so that students whose estimated family contribution was \$0 did not need to apply; funds were sent directly to the students' accounts. To date, we have disbursed a total of \$43,132,496 in relief to 34,591 students through both federal and local funds.

Students who enroll at Texas State next fall and spring semesters can continue to receive emergency grant funds thanks to HEERF. In fact, we are planning to provide an additional \$52,6295,515 through HEERF this coming academic year. However, this emergency funding is only part of our ongoing work to keep a Texas State education affordable to as many students as possible. We are also tripling the amount of merit-based financial aid being offered to next fall's freshman class, going from \$5 million to \$15 million, and we have raised the threshold for what students can owe the university and still enroll in classes by 1,500%. This type of bold action is sized to respond to the size of the disruption caused by

the pandemic. We are committed to honoring our employees by doing whatever it takes to get our students back on our campuses.

financial aid These programs underscore our commitment to helping students continue to pursue their college education through challenging times. As we emerge from the worst of the pandemic's impacts over the past year, I am looking forward to welcoming our students back on to our campuses this fall. We may not exactly know what the next academic year holds. but I am eager to tackle whatever comes our way, and I am confident we will live up to any challenges presented. My confidence is rooted in the good work that all of you, our staff, have done over the past year. Your amazing work, resiliency, and flexibility have been an inspiration and remind me on a regular basis how great it is to be a Bobcat.
