

North Carolina, enjoys writing poetry, and has 26 siblings from birth, adoption, step and half! Welcome, Phlatt!


### Callie Payne

# **Spotlight On...** Parking Services



Parking Services, part of the Transportation Services Department, must provide adequate, reasonably convenient and safe access for all employees, students, and visitors to the campus through coordinated management of parking and transportation resources. It is also a parking system that is self-supporting, meaning it must generate its own revenue. There are three offices on the San Marcos campus and one office on the Round Rock campus. The main Parking Services office is located in Matthews Street Parking Garage. When fully staffed, there are thirty-seven full-time workers and between twenty-five and thirty student/NSNR workers.

Stephen Prentice is the Assistant Director of Parking Services. He has been with the university for over thirty years. As the assistant director, he manages and oversees the Parking Services office, its personnel and its functions. There are eight positions that report to him.

Melissa Stein is the Head Cashier for Parking Services. She joined Parking Services in 2003. Melissa oversees three cashiers in the San Marcos office and one cashier in the Round Rock office. She supervises all financial transactions in San Marcos and Round Rock, including online payment of parking permits and citations. Melissa also is responsible for daily deposits, permit issuance and interdepartmental transactions.

Milus "Don" Steen is the Parking Facilities Maintenance Supervisor. Don came to Parking Services in 2006. He supervises five grounds maintenance workers, one service coordinator and one painter. Don's responsibilities include the planning and directing of parking facilities maintenance and repairs as well as fleet maintenance. Parking Services maintains its own fleet, the parking lots, the parking garages and the grounds surrounding the parking lots and garages.

Together, Roy Serrano and Sharon Wilsford have over twenty-six years with Parking Services. They have fourteen Parking Services Officers as well as student ticket writers that report to them on the San Marcos campus and one Parking Services Officer on the Round Rock campus. They manage parking enforcement, customer complaints, motor assists and special events as well as staffing the three parking booths located on the San Marcos campus.

Parking Services' System Support Specialist II is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of electronic hardware and software for all computers, handheld ticket writing machines and data network. The System Support Specialist manages information security and provides IT assistance as needed.

### **Travel Smart** Timely travel tips

### Healthy Swimming and **Recreational Water Illnesses**

Warm weather and swimming go hand in hand. When you jump into a pool, river, lake or even at the beach, you should be aware of a few things about whether the water is clean and safe to swim in. If water is polluted with disease causing organisms, they may make you sick. Sometimes people don't even realize that they got sick from swimming because it can take one to three days for symptoms to occur. Most of these illnesses aren't dangerous and will go away in a few days.

#### **Recreational Water Illnesses** (RWIs)

RWIs are caused by germs spread by swallowing, breathing in mists or aerosols of, or having contact with contaminated water in swimming pools, hot tubs, water parks, water play areas, interactive fountains, rivers, lakes, or oceans. A wide variety of symptoms such as gastrointestinal, skin, ear, respiratory, eye, neurologic, and wound infections are caused by RWIs. Diarrhea is the most commonly reported RWI.

### Rivers, Lakes, and Beaches

Also, did vou know that after a rainfall, rivers, lakes and oceans can get contaminated from storm water runoff and sewage? As rain water flows over places like parks, lawns and farms, it can pick up viruses and bacteria from fecal matter and other contaminants. Therefore after it rains, wait a couple of days before swimming in the river to allow things to clear up. The bacterial counts in rivers and lakes skyrocket and stay elevated several days after the rain event. The water eventually flows out to beaches too. As a result, many popular public beaches get tested regularly to monitor for contamination. The EPA's homepage will provide information whether bacterial levels in the water are monitored and whether the beach

is open for swimming.

### **Brain-Eating Amoebas**

On rare occasions, there are amoebas that can exist in warm fresh waters. Naegleria fowleri and Balamuthia mandrillaris can infect people when water containing the amoeba enters the body through the nose or wounds. This typically occurs when people go swimming or diving in warm freshwater places, like lakes, rivers and even hot springs. If the amoeba travels up the nose or through the bloodstream, it can then travel up to the brain where it can destroy brain tissue, thus the term "brain-eating amoeba", which is usually fatal. You cannot get infected from drinking water contaminated with the amoebas. Wear nose plugs to reduce the risk of these organisms.

#### Maintaining appropriate chlorine levels?

Another bit of information to be aware of is that contrary to popular belief, chlorine does not instantly kill all germs. Today, there are chlorine resistant germs known to cause human diseases such as the case with Cryptosporidium (Crypto for short). Crypto is an intestinal protozoa that causes a bad case of watery stools. Other microorganisms that cause diarrhea are Giardia, Shigella, norovirus and E. coli O157:H7. Maintaining the appropriate chlorine levels in pools is critical in preventing growth of these germs.

You can find additional information on the CDC's website under Healthy Swimming/Recreational Water. Learn the basic facts about healthy swimming and preventing RWIs to keep you and your family safe and healthy every time you go out and have fun in the water.


Changes made during Summer Enrollment take effect on September 1, 2015.


