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Research Enhancement Program



All full-time Texas State faculty members with full-time, continuing nine-month academic appointments are encouraged to apply for Research Enhancement Program grants. Tenured, tenure-track, and clinical faculty who hold the rank of assistant professor, associate professor or professor may apply as principal investigators (PIs) or co-investigators (CIs). Nontenure line senior lecturers may apply as co-investigators with eligible PIs. This is an internally-funded competition; individuals are eligible to apply for a maximum of \$8,000; two or more eligible faculty working together on one project may request a maximum of \$16,000. Final recommendations for funding of Research Enhancement Grants are made by the University Research Enhancement Committee through the Faculty Senate. Applications are due October 17. Apply via the Texas State Internal Proposal Online Submission page.

Carnegie Fellows Program

The University has been invited to nominate up to two faculty members for the Andrew Carnegie Fellows Program. The Carnegie Corporation of New York established the Program during 2015, in order to provide a major boost to the social sciences and humanities. Each year, the Corporation provides more than 30 of the country's most creative thinkers (who hold nontenure line, tenure-track, and tenured positions) with grants. Fellowships of \$200,000 support research aligned with the stated 2019 topics. Your grant can start with a two-page project summary submitted to your Dean. Dean's nominations are due to the Associate Provost by October 18.

Parking Services Update



With ongoing construction and renovation of the Blanco garage, parking spaces are limited in West Campus. The good news is that renovation of the Blanco garage should be completed soon. In the meantime, Parking Services recommends that faculty use Matthews Street and Wood Street Garages. 29 red spaces have been recently added to Wood Street Garage. As construction on Ingram Hall comes to a close, about 30 spaces along Wood Street next to the engineering building will open, and once the project is completed the +/- 40 spaces next to Supple Science still being used for staging will also open. Finally, a 217-space lot being planned for the fenced area between Wood and Lindsay. On the other side of campus, red parking spaces in R2, next to Facilities, has been temporarily decreased due the repair of the retaining wall. Work on the retaining wall will be completed in November.

He has written over 150 papers on topics including reasoning, decision making, and motivation. Art also brings insights from cognitive science to a broader audience through his blogs at Psychology Today and Fast Company as well as his radio show and podcast *Two Guys on Your Head* produced by KUT. He is the author of several books including *Smart Thinking*, *Smart Change*, and *Brain Briefs* (which was written with his *Two Guys* co-host Bob Duke).
