Part-Time Faculty Excellence in Teaching Award



As a means to further the University's efforts to recognize outstanding faculty and to acknowledge the many and important contributions of the nontenure line faculty, this policy establishes an awards program for recognizing part-time faculty excellence in teaching and outlines a process for selecting and making these awards. This award is intended to recognize instructors who have not historically been eligible for university teaching awards. One award may be given per academic college annually. Each award will consist of a certificate signed by the college dean and a monetary award of \$1,000. All faculty members teaching 75% or less FTE in both long semesters of the preceding calendar year are eligible for

these awards, exclusive of those faculty members who have received this award in the preceding three years. For policy and application procedures, visit the senate website.

Academic Freedom Corner



This section is a new feature of the Bulletin that highlights the activities of the <u>Academic Freedom</u> <u>Committee</u>, chaired by Senator Luizzi.

- The Academic Freedom Committee is compiling concerns that faculty have submitted along with its responses. The results will be available soon on the senate's website. The Committee invites faculty to submit additional concerns to include in this summary: Contact the Academic Freedom Committee.
- The Faculty Grievance Policy (<u>AA PPS 04.02.32</u>) now includes violations of academic freedom as grievable. Further, the standard for evaluation of most grievances is relaxed to one requiring that the grievance be substantiated.
- In collaboration with the senate, the Academic Freedom Committee is drafting a PPS on Academic Freedom.

Mass Vaccination Planning Work Group

The Faculty Senate is represented by Senator Blasingame on the <u>COVID-19 work group</u> charged with developing a plan for vaccination. Two vaccines are ready to go to the FDA for approval. Dr. Carranco anticipates the FDA will review those vaccines on December 10. As stressed by Dr. Carranco in last month's town hall update, the Texas Department of State Health Services will make the priority decisions for who gets the vaccine. Dr. Carranco believes there is a good chance Texas State University and other universities will be part of the second phase of vaccinations, which could happen in February or March. Faculty Development Leave and Nontenure Line Faculty Workload Release Recommendations

The senate recently recommended for approval to the Provost 55 Faculty Development Leave (FDL) applications and 11 applications for Nontenure Line Faculty Workload Release (NLFWR) for the 2021-22 academic year. The FDL program is authorized by the Texas Legislature and funded by the Texas State administration, and the NLFWR program was created and is funded by Texas State. The programs have been established to improve the education of students and provide time for faculty to accomplish work not possible during the course of a semester in which faculty are teaching, conducting scholarly/creative activities, and performing service. Thank you to the faculty who submitted applications to these programs this year and we look forward to an announcement from the Provost's office in December.

Encouraging Academic Honesty

Naming Task Force



In the spirit of inclusiveness and celebration, and recognizing the significant contributions to Texas State University of distinguished individuals from the Hispanic/Latina/o/x and Black communities, a Naming Task Force has been established by President Trauth and co-chaired by Dr. Scott Bowman, Associate Professor in the School of Criminal Justice and Criminology and Special Assistant to the Provost for Inclusion and Diversity, and Dr. Gloria Martinez, Professor in the Department of Sociology, Director of the Center for Diversity and Gender Studies, and Director of the Latina/o/x Studies Minor. Senator Mendez represents the Faculty Senate on this task force.

The purpose of the Naming Task Force is to establish an inclusive process through which our university community can engage in the renaming of two residence halls--Angelina and San Gabriel located on the San Marcos Campus--and the naming of two unnamed streets on the Round Rock Campus after distinguished members of the Texas State family who are no longer employed or enrolled at Texas State, and who are from the Black and Hispanic/Latina/o/x communities. Here you will find information to submit your selection for nomination. Please provide as much information as possible, as it will assist in the formal nomination process. TRIO McNair Program

The U.S. Department of Education supports disadvantaged students with eight TRIO programs.

Texas State continues to apply for funding to establish a TRIO McNair Program at Texas State. The McNair Program prepares minority undergraduate students for doctoral studies and depends on faculty participation for activities like mentoring and joint research.
