Committee Preference Survey



Academic Affairs Policy and Procedure Statement 01.02.11 calls for the job performance of school directors and department chairs at Texas State University to be evaluated annually. Part of the evaluation process is a survey that invites Texas State faculty members to assess their director or chair on a number of standard performance measures. Institutional Research has recently distributed this survey for faculty to provide their perceptions of their director's or chair's performance during calendar year 2020. Mass Vaccination Planning Work Group

The Faculty Senate is represented by Senator Blasingame on the <u>COVID-19 work group</u> charged with preparing for vaccinations on campus. As stated in Dr. Emilio Carranco's recent email to faculty, staff and students, Texas State has a plan in place for mass vaccinations if the university receives vaccine from the Texas Department of State Health Services. Until that happens, Dr. Carranco has recommended that members of the Texas State community who are eligible for vaccine get vaccinated through a hub or other provider. Encouraging Academic Honesty



Remote teaching brings new complexities to fostering academic integrity that faculty may not encounter in the face-to-face classroom. Senator Davenport shares two videos on how to reduce academic dishonesty that may be helpful. They were published on IdeaBook and will be incorporated into online training through the Office of Distance and Extended Learning.

Life Anew: Restorative Justice

Life Anew, a consulting service contracted by the university, will conduct restorative justice training this spring 2021 with students, staff, and faculty. This initiative, sponsored by Institutional Inclusive Excellence, provides services to define and implement restorative justice practices within institutions. The program builds skills to foster and restore dialog and advance inclusive practices in a university community.





The Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP), which is part of the SACSCOC-mandated accreditation and reaffirmation process, is designed to enhance the quality of education at its member institutions. For Texas State's current reaffirmation cycle, the QEP's theme concerns undergraduate research. More specifically, the QEP seeks to offer a pathway for undergraduates from any academic discipline to participate in mentored research and creative expression. To help make this possible, the QEP has set three goals: (1) assisting undergraduates in gaining awareness of research and ethical research practices, (2) helping students to synthesize research, and (3) enabling students to produce a research or creative project. The Innovation, Discovery, Exploration, and Analysis (IDEA) Center, which will be part of University College and will be located in Alkek Library, will be responsible for measuring and evaluating the outcomes of the QEP's goals and for creating and offering a sequence of student experiences including an undergraduate research-oriented informational forum, workshops, tutorials, coursework, and culminating in a research/creative expression showcase. The QEP-related informational forum, workshops, and tutorials will begin in spring 2022. More information is available on the QEP's website.
