Melissa A. Martinez from the College of Education at Texas State University is hosting a series of higher-education workshops entitled Universidad Empieza en el Hogar/University Starts at Home. The series runs until March 28, occurring on Thursday evenings from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. in the CM Allen Homes community center.

The workshops created by Martinez will focus on empowering San Marcos' Spanish-speaking parents with the knowledge and tools they need in order to prepare their children for post-secondary education.
