## Inquest Reporting

#### **Deaths Requiring an Inquest:**

- 1.Person dies in prison (other than natural /execution) or jail
- 2.Person dies an unnatural death (other than execution)
- 3.Body or body part found, cause or circumstances of death unknown
- 4.Circumstances indicate that the death may have been caused unlawfully
- 5.Suicide or circumstances indicate possible suicide
- 6.Person dies without having been attended by physician
- 7.Person dies while attended, but physician cannot certify cause of death
- 8.Person is a child under six, and an inquest is required by Chapter 264, Family Code

# What kinds of a deaths require□ reporting?

Person dies an unnatural death

Could be a traffic fatality or a drowning

 Body or body part found, cause or circumstances of death unknown


Could be an unidentified person

 Suicide or circumstances indicate possible suicide

## Why is reporting important?

- Accurate statewide data
- Injury and death prevention
- Public informed

### **Traffic Fatalities**

Transportation Code Sec. 550.081

A monthly report MUST be submitted detailing all traffic fatalities

Must be submitted by the 11th day of the month – even if the number is <u>zero</u>.

Name of the deceased Driver, passenger, or pedestrian? Date Location

# If testing was performed: Name of the lab Test Results

Results are unavailable? Say so.

File a supplemental report 'as soon as practicable' when the results are available



#### **Injury Reporting**

- Must be made within 90 days of the death
- Must be made through the Texas EMS & Trauma Registries

### **Traumatic Brain Injury**

An acquired injury to the brain, including brain injuries caused by anoxia due to submersion incidents. This could be a physical blow or hit to the head that caused death or a suffocation that prevented enough oxygen going to the brain and causing death, like drowning.

### **Spinal Cord Injury**

An acute, traumatic lesion of the neural elements in the spinal canal, resulting in any degree of sensory deficit, motor deficits, or bladder/bowel dysfunction. This generally means the person was paralyzed in some way from the injury that killed them.

#### **Submersion Fatalities**

The fatal or non-fatal process of experiencing respiratory impairment from submersion/immersion in liquid. This is basically drowning. There is a specific reporting form for this type of death.

An injury or wound to a living body caused by the application of an external force, including but not limited to violence, burns, poisonings, submersion incidents, traumatic brain injuries, traumatic spinal cord injuries, and suffocations.

### "Trauma"

Other severely injured trauma patients whose injury meets the department's inclusion criteria based on the data dictionaries and admitted to a hospital inpatient setting for more than 48 hours, or died after receiving any evaluation or treatment, or was dead on arrival, or transferred into or out of a hospital

### "Significant trauma injuries"

A case in which an injury is assumed, but a diagnosis is not yet made.

### "Suspected case"



Family Code §264.514(b).

#### **Child Abuse**

If it is determined by you that the death was the result of abuse or neglect

#### you must immediately notify:

- an appropriate law enforcement agency, and
  - •the appropriate county child fatality review team of the child's death within 120 days of the death reported to you

## Unidentified Person

Two places to report:

- DPS
- National Crime
   Information Center
   By the 10<sup>th</sup> day after
   investigation began

- fingerprints
- hair color
- eye color
- height
- weight
- deformities
- tattoo marks

& other facts required for assistance in identifying the decedent

#### **Department of Public Safety**

You must report the death to the missing children and missing persons information clearinghouse

## Communicable Disease

"An illness that occurs through the transmission of an infectious agent or its toxic products from a reservoir to a susceptible host, either directly, as from an infected person or animal, or indirectly through an intermediate plant or animal host, a vector, or the inanimate environment"

If you conduct an inquest where you believe that the cause of death may be related to a communicable disease, you must immediately report it to the health authority in your county or the Texas Department of Health.



#### **Suicide**

- You report this data when you check the box for 'suicide' under "Manner of Death" on a death certificate.
- You can choose (as a county)
  to do additional data collection
  on suicide by entering into a
  memorandum of
  understanding with another
  authorized entity to share
  suicide data without naming
  the deceased.

#### Why would you want to do this?

- Non-metro (rural) areas have a significantly higher suicide rate than metro areas. In 2015, the rate was 11% for metro areas and 17% for non-metro areas.
- From 2011 2015, Smith County had the highest average suicide rate in Texas.
- Suicide is the 10<sup>th</sup> leading cause of death in the U.S., and the 2<sup>nd</sup> leading cause of death for people aged 10–34.

## How to collect this data

#### The shared data may include:

- date of birth, race or national origin, gender, and zip code of residence
- any school or college the deceased individual was attending at the time of death
- the suicide method used by the deceased individual
- status as a veteran or member of the armed services
- date of the deceased individual's death.



NO civil or criminal liability is deceased is not named

MAY share data as authorized by law

Data is not confidential

An authorized entity under a memorandum of understanding may periodically release suicide data (without the name) to an agency or organization with recognized expertise in suicide prevention *That agency may only use the data for suicide prevention purposes.*
