

Why hold virtual hearings?


Cannot hold in-person hearings

Courts <u>must not conduct in-person proceedings</u> contrary to the Guidance for All Court Proceedings During COVID-19 Pandemic ("Guidance") issued by the Office of Court Administration, which may be updated from time to time, regarding social distancing, maximum group size, and other restrictions and precautions. Prior to holding any in-person proceedings, a court must submit an operating plan that is consistent with the requirements set forth in the Guidance. Courts must continue to use all reasonable efforts to conduct proceedings remotely.




Because it is required, let's look at how to sign up for Zoom

Steps:

- 1. Texas Courts website: <u>https://www.txcourts.gov/</u>
- 2. Click 'Electronic Hearings (Zoom)' in the top line of the "ANNOUNCEMNTS" box
- 3. Email: zoomhelp@txcourts.gov to ask four your court's account access



Let's take a look:






What does "unable to sucessfully participate in remote hearings for reasons beyond the court's control" mean?

- » This applies to the parties not the court's inability to participate. The court has a free Zoom account waiting for it through OCA
- » Some parties may not have enough data, a smart phone, internet
- » Can set up a 'Zoom room' physically at your courthouse
- » Can hold in person IF you meet the Regional Presiding Judge's 'operating plan for all courts'
