Course Description: Taken in two consecutive semesters, this seminar provides an orientation to the graduate program, and the steps required for thesis completion. Topics include the discussion of research interests, critiquing literature, and topic selection; developing and submitting a research proposal, selecting a thesis committee, and thesis completion and submission.

Course Objectives: Provide an orientation to the Master of Arts in Psychological Research program through a focus on the following topics:

1. **Thesis Project Development**, through:

- Identification of research interests; selection of an appropriate research design; determining the appropriate methods and procedures to carry out the proposed research; and, thesis proposal development <u>all completed in regular consultation with the student's mentor.</u>
- Fostering effective oral and written communication skills and critical thinking.
- 2. Research Management Skills, through:
 - Developing a research protocol and manual of operations for a particular study, including recruitment and running participant appointments.
 - Submitting applications to the IRB and practicing principles of ethical conduct in research.
 - Fostering professionalism and career development.

Required Reading: MAPR Graduate Handbook and selected readings to be posted on TRACS

Course Policies:

- 1. Attendance: Attendance is expected in class. In the event of illness or another emergency situation, students are expected to obtain notes and relevant materials from a classmate before contacting me regarding missed material. - You will draft your CV including the following sections: personal information, education, honors/awards/scholarships, relevant research experience/skills, teaching experience, presentations/publications, professional affiliations, professional service and other categories as needed.

- The CV will be due on Sept. 13 by 5 pm via TRACS

2. Summary of Research Interests

- Write a 200 word summary of your research interests.
- This summary will be posted with your picture on the MAPR website.

- Summaries are due Sept. 27 by 5pm on TRACS

3. Research Interest Presentations

- Create an approximately 10 minute PowerPoint presentation discussing your research interests (your thesis topic should be a piece of the presentation if you have multiple interests).
- This presentation may include definitions/key terminology, psychological theories, statistics, and/or examples of major past studies relevant to your interests
- Use your research interest summary due Sept. 27 as the starting point to creating your presentation
- You will use Sign Up on TRACS to sign up for presentation slots (Oct. 11, 18, and 25).

<u>3. References List for 3 citations</u>

- After our visit to the library to learn about library resources with the Psychology Librarian, please prepare an APA style references list for 3 citations relevant to your area of research: one article, one book, and one chapter in edited volume.
- The references list will be due Oct. 18 by 5 pm on TRACS

5. Outline Presentations

- Create a PowerPoint presentation that is an outline of your literature review for your thesis
- From this outline, fill in the spaces to write your final paper for this class.
- Consult your thesis mentor as you develop your presentation; they may, for example, point you to relevant authors in your field.

6. Final Paper

- Write the literature review for your thesis in regular consultation with your thesis mentor.
- Your literature review should conform to the Graduate College's formatting guidelines
- I will check in your mentor several times throughout the semester, and I will ask him/her for final approval of your literature review. **Mentor approval is required for submission.**
