
## **FACULTY**

Brinckmeyer was quoted in "The 'Glee' effect: Singing is cool again," saying that educators say they're "seeing a surge in interest in show choirs thanks to 'Glee.'" She also noted that show choirs "involve elaborate sets, singing, dancing and costumes." She went on

Mollie Tower recently had a new education publication released, Spotlight on Music: Interactive Listening Maps, by the Macmillan/McGraw-Hill Publishing Company, New York City. Ms. Tower is a co-author of the product, including a set of 150 electronic and animated listening maps to assist students in grades K-8 to study music literature from all periods of music history and performing groups.

Dr. Ian Davidson joined professors from institutions in California and Texas for a series of chamber music concerts, sponsored by the Wild Basin Winds. In addition to outreach concerts at the Settlement Home and the Williamson County Detention Center, the group was invited by the Fredericksburg Music Club to give a formal concert of classics for woodwind quintet.
