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UNDERSTANDING ACADEMIC TERMINOLOGY

Degree

The culmination of coursework completed and requirements met.

Major

The main field of study.

Minor

The secondary field of study. Not all degrees require a minor.

Concentration

A particular field of study within a major. Not all degrees have an option for a concentration.

Core Curriculum

The coursework every student must complete to graduate regardless of major. Covers a broad set of info for a well-rounded education.

Credits/Hours

Earned after completing courses; estimated time spent per week in class. Enrollment status (full-time or part-time) is based on semester credit hours.



Students should visit an academic advisor with questions about academic terms that are unclear.

- Class size ranges from 17 380

Admission type vs classification

Admission Type

First Year Student

Enters Texas State immediately following high school

Transfer

Transfers to Texas State from another institution

Continuing

Attends Texas State last semester and continues to attend this semester

Returning

Returns to Texas State after taking at least one semester away

Classification

Freshman

0-29 credit hours complete

Sophomore

30-59 credit hours complete

Junior

60-89 credit hours complete

Senior

90+ credit hours complete

Academic Advising




