

While working on adult literacy programs in Central America during the early 1980s, María Suárez Toro

worried that the violent conflict that plagued the region would never end. What kept her going was the strength and perseverance of the women she worked with in Costa Rica. Honduras, Guatemala, Salvador, and Nicaragua.

Although many lacked formal education, women who lived in the middle of conflict had important ideas about how to end it. María was inspired by what they had to say and dismayed that no one was listening.

In 1991, when asked to start a feminist radio program, María jumped at the chance to give a voice to grassroots women. Together with Katerina Anfossi, María set up the Feminist International Radio Endeavor. or FIRE.

Mass Communications 4308 - Women and Minorities in the Media - An intensive look into the roles of women and minorities in the media.

Sociology 3350 - Men, Women, and Societies - This course examines the relationships between male and female roles throughout the world, including the United States, Europe, and third world countries. Special attention is given to changes in these roles and the consequences of such changes for societies, including familial, marital, and sexual relations.

Courses Available For Summer I 2007

Anthropology 1312 - Cultural Anthropology - This course examines the nature of culture and its various aspects as these are manifest in contemporary and traditional societies.

Communications 3329 - Intercultural Communication - Presents theory and application of communication skills for a culturally diverse world. Develops verbal and nonverbal abilities in social and professional intercultural contexts. (Prerequisites: COMM 2315, 2330, or 2338)

Geography 3308 - Latin America - A regional survey of the physical and cultural geography of Latin America.

Geography 3329 - Geography of Texas - A physical and cultural geography of Texas with special emphasis on human resources and economic activities.

History 3375A - American Labor History 1877-1945 - The history of American labor from the American Revolution to the present.

Mass Communications 4308 - Women and Minorities in the Media - An intensive look into the roles of women and minorities in the media.

Spanish 3371 - Spanish-American Civilization - A survey of civilizations and cultures of Latin America and the Hispanic U.S. designed to provide a background for the better understanding of both groups. (Prerequisite: SPAN 3308)

English 3344 - Chicano/a Narrative and Social History - A survey of narratives written by U.S. citizens of Mexican descent.

History 3327 - History of Mexico to 1848 - A survey of Mexico from prehistoric times to the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo. History 3372 - Texas History: A Survey - A one-semester survey of Texas history which will emphasize political, economic and social development from prehistory to the twentieth century.

Sociology 3327 - Multicultural Relations - Course will examine the nature and the problems inherent in racial and other minority groups with special reference to the American scene.

Women's Studies Minor

Courses Available For Fall 2007

<u>Women's Studies 3376</u> - <u>Images of Women</u> - This course, one of two multi-disciplinary team-taught women's studies courses, is a survey of the changing images of women in the United States since 1800 through the eyes of historians, writers, artists, orators, the media, and educators.

Anthropology 3350 - Gender and Sexuality in Cross-cultural Perspective - This course examines historical and contemporary issues related to gender and sexuality from a global, cross-cultural perspective. It will focus on cultural constructions of gender and sexuality, including gender stratifications, biology and evolution, families and kinship, work, sex work, diverse sexualities, media representations, and domestic and sexual violence.

<u>Communication 3328</u> - <u>Communication and Gender</u> - Investigates the interactive nature of communication and gender, the creation of gender identities, and the role of gender and communication in a variety of settings. (Prerequisites: COMM 2315)

Ethnic Studies Minor

Courses Available For Fall 2007

<u>Anthropology 1312</u> - <u>Cultural Anthropology</u> - Examines the nature of culture and its various aspects as these are manifest in contemporary and traditional societies. Provides for increased flexibility of human culture.

<u>Anthropology 3322</u> - <u>Peoples And Cultures Of Africa</u> - A general introduction to the contemporary peoples and cultures of sub-Saharan Africa.

<u>Art History 4301</u> - <u>Issues In Contemporary Art</u> - An issue-oriented survey of the diverse forms and concepts present in American art since 1965. Modernism and Postmodernism are explored.

<u>Communication 3329</u> - <u>Intercultural Communication</u> - Presents theory and application of communication skills for a culturally diverse world. Develops verbal and nonverbal abilities in social and professional intercultural contexts. (Prerequisites: COMM 2315, 2330, or 2338)

<u>Communication 4322</u> - <u>Rhetoric Of Protest Movement</u> - Explores the persuasive strategies used by protest and political movements to promote social and political change. Focuses upon the application of critical perspectives in understanding the stages, leadership styles, and rhetorical appeals that characterized movements in American society. (Prerequisite: COMM 2338)

English 3331 - African-American Literature - African-American poetry, drama, and fiction.

English 3344 - Chicano/a Narrative & Social History - A survey of narratives written by U.S. citizens of Mexican descent. **English 3345** - Southwestern Studies 1: Definition The Region - The first of two courses in a broad interdisciplinary survey of geophysical, cultural, social, literary, and political history of the Southwest that emphasizes regional and ethnic expressions of culture in architecture, art, economics, law, literature, philosophy, and politics.

<u>Geography 3329</u> - <u>Geography Of Texas</u> - A physical and cultural geography of Texas with special emphasis on human resources and economic activities.

History 33697 - Immigration And Ethnicity - A study of immigration and ethnicity in American history.

<u>History 3372</u> - <u>Texas History: A Survey</u> - A one-semester survey of Texas history which will emphasize political, economic and social development from prehistory to the twentieth century.

<u>History 4376</u> - <u>History Of Texas Music</u> - Examination of the evolution of music in Texas and the American Southwest, emphasizing how music reflects the richly diverse ethnic and cultural heritage of the region.

<u>Political Science 3319</u> - <u>Metropolitan Politics</u> - An examination of the political institutions and processes of urban and suburban America, including such topics as urban sprawl, reform movements, ethnic politics, and city-county consolidation.

<u>Psychology 3334</u> - <u>Psychology Of Human Diversity</u> - Explanations about how the environment, genetics, and culture shape human differences and how these differences are linked to world progress and understanding.

<u>Sociology 3327</u> - <u>Multicultural Relations</u> - Course will examine the nature and the problems inherent in racial and other minority groups with special reference to the American scene.

<u>Sociology 3366</u> - Folkways And Folklore: An Introduction - A study of the folkways of the cultures of Texas through selected examples of traditional beliefs, customs, folktales, songs, arts, games, artifacts, and techniques for the collection and preservation of folk materials.

Spanish 3305 - Survey Of Spanish-American Literature - A study of Spanish-American literature from the colonial period to 1880 and its antecedents in Spain. (Prerequisite: SPAN 3308)

Spanish 3371 - Spanish-American Civilization - A survey of civilizations and cultures of Latin America and the Hispanic U.S. designed to provide a background for the better understanding of both groups. (Prerequisite: SPAN 3308)
