

Mario Molina has been involved in developing our understanding of the chemistry of the stratospheric ozone layer and its susceptibility to human-made perturbations. He has received several awards for his scientific work, including the 1995 Nobel Prize in Chemistry, which he shared with Professors F. S. Rowland and P. Crutsen for their work in atmospheric chemistry. He is also pursuing interdisciplinary work on tropospheric pollution issues, working with colleagues from many other disciplines on the problem of rapidly growing cities with severe air pollution problems. Congresswoman Nydia M. Velazquez has made history several times during her tenure in Congress. In 1992, she was the first Puerto Rican woman elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. In February of 1998, she was named Ranking Democratic Member of the House Small Business Committee, making her the first Hispanic woman to serve as Chair of Ranking Member of a full committee in the history of the House.
