

(You should do so because a percentage of the questions on the midcourse and final exams come from the self-assessments and quizzes; you need to review the self-assessments, the quizzes, and the essay and paper feedback that I will provide as well as the other required material to study for your exams.) You will not be permitted to consult your notes, your textbook, or any other written materials during the exam, and you will have two-and-a-half hours to take each exam.

What is Online Proctoring?

Online proctoring is when a remote exam is monitored by either technology or a live person virtually. Having your exam monitored may seem concerning, but it's anything but. Taking an online proctored exam is just like taking one in person, but with more benefits. Not only can online proctored exams be safer and more secure than in person ones, but they give you the freedom to test at your own convenience.

Texas State University uses a tool called Examity for online proctoring. In this brief module, you will:
