A Resolution

2 To be entitled "A Resolution to Partner with the University
3 Police Department to Create Free Speech Education Trainings for
4 Students and Emergency Responders" Relating to misinformation
5 regarding free speech rights on campus.

WHEREAS: On November 6th, a group of demonstrators incited an 6 7 aggressive protest on campus. The group yielded signs that offended many individuals, inciting a counter- protest, 8 9 mass online and televised media response, and physical and verbal attacks made by students. Although the rhetoric 10 was acknowledged as harmful and hateful by the university 11 president, the group acted within their First Amendment 12 right and could not be removed for hateful speech or 13 14 signage; and

15 WHEREAS: There are many misconceptions regarding the limitations 16 and freedoms of the First Amendment, as members of the 17 community expressed counter-opinions, but did so in a way 18 that violated the First Amendment rights of the initial 19 demonstrators who had to be escorted off campus. Therefore, misconceptions regarding the university's capacity to respond in these high-tense situations, as well as the actions that can be taken by protestors to stay in legal and university compliance- regarding issues such as signage, disruption, and violence- are crucial to being resolved to keep our constituents safe; and

26 WHEREAS: In a panel discussion about police-student relationships 27 held in collaboration with UPD by the Texas State NAACP 28 chapter, students expressed concerns about officer-29 student relationships and communication, as well as the 30 ability to express opinions and file suggestions or 31 objections; and

BE IT ENACTED: Trainings should be provided regularly to both 32 students and responders to better educate individuals 33 Amendment 34 about First quidelines and emotional 35 manipulation tactics, or "rage bait," that leads to violent expressions and actions. Additionally, the 36 trainings should address common misconceptions and allow 37 individuals from all backgrounds to ask questions or 38 39 express comments about protests on campus. Trainings should be conducted in partnership with UPD, the Texas 40 State University Expressive Activity Team, local law 41 enforcement, student representatives, 42 and external

representatives from interest groups to better inform the
Texas State community about expression, to increase
trust, encourage productive collaborations, and improve
relationships; and

47 BE IT FURTHER ENACTED: This resolution be forwarded to the Student
