PSY 3315 Psychopathology

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Course Description

An introduction to the study of psychopathology: (1) issues in defining and evaluating it, (2) examples, (3) theories and research attempting to categorize, describe, and explain it, and (4) approaches used to prevent or change it when it is deemed a problem by the individual and/or society.

Scope & Nature of the Course

In this course, you will be given a detailed look at the causes, consequences, and possible treatments for psychopathology/ "abnormal behavior." We will discuss what makes a behavior "abnormal" as well as what techniques may be used to assess behavior. We will survey mental disorders as described in the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, 5th Edition, Text Revision (DSM-5-TR)* (American Psychiatric Association, 2022). This will include diagnosis, classification, and treatment of various mental and behavioral disorders. As time permits, we will track the development of various treatment techniques and use case examples, films, and other demonstrations whenever possible to illustrate key points. Abnormal behavior is a vast and complicated area of psychology and covers everything from depression to hallucinations to phobias. We will attempt to understand these disorders in terms of factors that may have led to their development and what factors might help us understand, explain, and, eventually, cure and prevent them.

Required Materials

You are required to use the following text, which comes inside a platform called Achieve. This platform includes activities for assignments as well as other resources, such as practice quizzes, videos, flashcards, and LearningCurve activities you can use for self-improvement. The Achieve site will show this as a Summer 2023 term, but you should ignore that since this course has continuous enrollment and students are added at various times.

The e-book in Achieve is available for 6 months, but you can download specific chapters or the entre e-book for up to 4 years by going to the drop-down menu under your name on the Achieve site (upper right corner) and selecting "Read E-book on Vital Source Bookshelf." Turn off pop-up

blockers. You may have to create a password for this. Do not select "Download E-Book from App Store" from that drop-down menu or you will have to pay again.

Prerequisite

A course in Introduction to Psychology (PSY 1300 at Texas State) is the prerequisite for this course.

Student Learning Outcomes and Course Content Objectives

The Department of Psychology has adopted expected student learning outcomes for the undergraduate major, the graduate major, and for PSY 1300, a general education course meeting a requirement for the social and behavioral science component. These expected student learning outcomes are available for your review via the <u>Psychology Department's assessment page</u>.

After completing this course, you should be able to discuss and describe the following:

- what abnormal behavior/psychopathology is,
- how psychopathology/abnormal behaviors develop,
- basic assessment of psychopathology/abnormal behavior,
- · basic classification methods in psychopathology/abnormal behavior,
- basic disorders and distinguish between them, and treatments used for each major disorder discussed.

Course Procedure

You have six months from your date of enrollment to complete this course. The course is divided into three parts, each comprised of four lessons. Each lesson contains an assignment. Exams occur after each set of four lessons. (Completing the <u>Course Pacing Guide</u> before you begin your first lesson will help you plan your progress throughout the course.) For each lesson, it is expected that you will carefully read and review the assigned chapters from your text and the material posted in the modules of this online course. The lessons in this online course include a review of some of the major points from the text and provide additional material that is not included in your text. To complete each lesson in this course, read the assigned textbook chapter(s) and read the online lesson content.

Grading, Exams, and Assignments

To keep track of your understanding of the material covered in this course, you will complete a variety of assessments and assignments.

Exams: You will take a total of three exams in this course. The first two will consist of 40 multiplechoice questions and will be worth 120 points each (which means each question will be worth 3 points). The final exam will be comprehensive and will consist of 80 multiple-choice questions, worth 3 points each, for a total of 240 points. *Note that you must earn a score of 60% or higher on the cumulative final exam to pass this course.* Information on exam procedures can be found on the <u>Correspondence Course Testing Policies</u> webpage.

To uphold academic integrity during exams, we will be using Proctorio, an online proctoring tool. This technology helps ensure a fair testing environment by monitoring exam conditions through video, audio, and web traffic analysis. Proctorio is designed to deter academic dishonesty while allowing you the flexibility of taking exams remotely. Please make sure to install the Proctorio extension on Google Chrome and familiarize yourself with the process before your assessments. Your cooperation in maintaining a secure testing environment is greatly appreciated.

Assignments: There are a variety of assignments that will be used in this course to track your understanding of the material. They will vary among the lessons. Here are some of the types of assignments that may be used:

Quizzes: Multiple choice quizzes comprised of 10 questions each.

Short Written Assignments: In these assignments, you may be asked to do some research on a topic or to compare and contrast issues from the readings.

Reactions and Video Reactions: You may see links to videos on the Achieve site or articles in the assignment. After you have viewed the video or read the article, you will be directed to write a short reaction to it.

You may submit no more than two assignments per week for this course. Please be aware that I have ten business days from the time you submit an assignment to grade and return it to you.

Your final grade is based on 610 points that are broken down as follows:

Exams 1 and 2: 120 points each (240 points total) — 39% of final grade Assignments: 10 points each (130 points total) — 21% of final grade Final exam: 240 points — 39% of final grade

Communication Policy

Even though this is a correspondence course, please feel free to contact me personally if you have any concerns, questions, or problems. E-mail is my preferred method of contact, but you must use the Canvas Inbox Mail tool in the left menu bar. (It is important to keep all mail related to this course contained within this Canvas site.) You may also leave me a phone message, and I will be notified of your call. My policy is that, except for holidays and announced away times, any e-mail I receive between Monday morning and Friday at noon will receive a reply within 48 hours. E-mails received between Friday at noon and Sunday night will receive a reply on the next business day. If you want to have a Zoom meeting, we can schedule that as well.
