1 A Bill

- 2 To be entitled "Utilities Budget Proposal Allocation Increase
- 3 for Environmental Service Fee Committee" relating to increasing
- 4 the allotment for the Environmental Service Fee Committee (ESFC)
- 5 from \$1 per student each semester to \$6.
- 6 WHEREAS: Texas State University historically established the
- 7 Environmental Service Fee (ESF) in 2003 in accordance with
- 8 §54.5111 of the State of Texas Education Code which
- 9 provides grants (§54.5111(c)) for "environmental
- 10 improvements at the institution through services related
- 11 to recycling, energy efficiency and renewable energy,
- 12 transportation, employment, product purchasing, planning
- and maintenance, or irrigation;" and
- 14 WHEREAS: The University recently absorbed the ESF into the utility
- 15 service budget with other fees. Associate VP of Facilities
- 16 Dan Costello and Cristine Black, Associate VP of Budget
- 17 & Planning at TXST, stated in recent meetings with the
- 18 Sustainability Committee and ESFC that an allocation of

19		\$1 per student per semester as prescribed by the original									
20		ESF legislation has been allotted to the ESFC, the									
21		committee which approves ESF grant funding via									
22		§54.5111(c); and									
23	WHEREAS:	The ESFC allocation has remained unchanged at \$1 per student									
24		per semester, despite inflation and growing demand for									
25		sustainability programs on campus. While other Texas									
26		universities have increased their ESFs to match inflation,									
27		Texas State University has never made adjustments to its fee,									
28		limiting the impact of its sustainability programs; and									
29	WHEREAS:	A recent survey conducted by the Department of									
30		Sustainability found that, as of February 17, 2025, 86%									
31		of students supported increasing the ESF for "enhanced									
32		funding for environmental programs and research," with 65%									
33		of those students favoring an increase of \$5; and									
34	WHEREAS:	An increase in funding would strengthen efforts to protect the									
35		university's wildlife and environment while fostering a culture									
36		of sustainability, as 67% of surveyed students and faculty									
37		strongly agree that sustainability is vital to supporting									
38		healthy communities; and									
39	WHEREAS:	Increased funding would improve the university's									
40		Sustainability Tracking, Assessment, and Rating System (STARS)									
41		score, enhancing its reputation and commitment to									
42		sustainability; and									

43	WHEREAS:	The	Sustainabili	ty Co	mmitte	e, ir	n col	labo	ration	with	the	ESFC

48 BE IT ENACTED: After extensive discussions, surveys, and collaboration, 49 the Sustainability Committee and Student Government Senate urge the university to increase the allotment for the ESFC to 50 51 honor a budget of \$6 per student per semester, or what would formerly be a \$6 Environmental Service Fee, 52 effectively increasing the "fee" by \$5. Doing so will provide 53 54 a sustainable budget for the ESFC to effectively operate and will ensure the continued growth and success of Texas State 55 University's sustainability initiatives. 56

57 **BE IT FURTHER ENACTED:** This bill be forwarded to the Student Body
58 President for further action.
