Course Description

This course is designed to give the student a fundamental understanding of the creation and appreciation of diverse modes of expression through the visual and performing arts. The purpose of Introduction to Fine Arts is to provide each student with an understanding of the diverse ways in which different cultures construct and represent their reality. Through thematic examination, the student will acquire a vocabulary to describe formal properties, techniques of artmaking, as well as social, psychological, and spiritual uses of art.

- Apply art terminology as it specifically relates to works of art;
- Demonstrate knowledge of art elements and principles of design;
- Differentiate between the processes and materials used in the production of various works of art;
- Critically interpret, evaluate, and contextualize works of art;
- Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of arts on culture and society.
