Preparing Jurors for Trial

Provide Information to Potential Jurors

- Introduce yourself, clerk, & bailiff
- Ask for phones on silent
- ♦ Thank the jurors for their service
- Explain the case/offense and jurisdiction (fine-only)
- Explain how many will be chosen
- Explain that each side will ask them questions
- Tell them not to mingle or communicate with parties or lawyers

Why?

Jurors will be more patient & be able to better pay attention if they know what to expect.

Voir Dire/Jury Selection

Oath for Selected Jurors

You and each of you do solemnly swear that in the case of the State of Texas against the defendant, you will a true verdict render according to the law and the evidence." Code of Criminal Procedure Art. 35.22.

Explain the Process

- Not a court of record
- Prosecutor/State brought the case and will go first because it's their burden (beyond a reasonable doubt)
- Defendant will have a chance to respond
- Deliberation after cases are presented
 - Jury Charge
