Hervee Jaar: Organized soccer. Never really played organized soccer. After that I

friends actually in the neighborhood, at school, that's where we played in

school. Organized, played a little bit at school at age nine or ten.

Hervee Jaar: When I graduated, organized soccer, no. I was just doing that for fun

because I had a lot of things to concentrate on. But just doing that for fun because it's a part of me. I still worked on the weekends. The camaradery

that comes, it was second nature for me.

John Mckiernan: What got you playing basketball?

Hervee Jaar: Basketball? Michael Jordan. Michael Jordan got me playing basketball.

You see that guy doing different things and you wish you could do the same things, so picked up my ball was 12, started playing basketball and

soccer, depending on what was the available, but I was more into

basketball. And after a certain age, around 38, 39, couldn't jump that high,

so running beyond that was ...

John Mckiernan: Easier?

Hervee Jaar: Easier for me

Hervee Jaar: Say defensive reads. Let the other ones do the work.

John Mckiernan: Great. When did you decide to become a ref?

Hervee Jaar: I decided to become a ref last year after actually watching a friend reffing

a game. So he gave me a different perspective on the game that I was not aware of. You know when you play a side, the referee to you is always the guy you're going against, but he's running the game, the manager of the game, and it was challenging. I was looking for a different challenge. Soccer, running, figure out how to run, at the same time trying to see a

different side of soccer that I had never experienced before.

John Mckiernan: Curiosity, how did you end up in Austin?

Hervee Jaar: I moved from Dallas to Austin and to the US, attended school. That's how

I got here to the US.

John Mckiernan: And that's how you make friends, basketball, soccer, school. Yeah. Well,

any other thoughts on soccer in Austin?

Hervee Jaar: Soccer in Austin is growing. The sport is growing. I'm very excited for the
